and Peter Quixstone doo hereby acknowledge and thereof and their from and
from every part and parcell thereof Dots freely fully and absolutely exonerate
quit and Discharge the Said John Worthington his heirs he: and he: and every
of them for these presents for ever he: given Granted bargained sold ~
offered alread remitt released and confirmed and by these presents ~
Dots give grant bargained sell liff off alien remitt released and confirmed
to the Said John Worthington his heirs and assigns for ever all those two ~
tracts of Land lying and being on the North Side of the Great branch of
Potowmout river in Anne Arundell County Commonly called (or known) by the ~
Names of Malborough Plains and Quixstones Thickett Malborough Plains ~
Beginning at two bounded white Oaks standing by a run called Steady ~
run and running West by South two hundred and Twenty perches to a bounded ~
white Oak standing on a hill by the North branch of Potowmout af: then
South by West down the said branch One hundred perches then South
West Seventeen perches then South by East Twenty perches then East
South East thirty three perches then East Sixty perches then East by South
forty four perches then North Twenty perches then North West by North
One hundred perches then North Twenty six perches then East by North
One hundred perches then South East by East Seventy four perches then
South South East thirty eight perches to a bounded white Oak then
South East by East Twenty five perches then with a straight line to
the first trees containing and laid out for One hundred and Fifty acres.
Quixstones Thickett Beginning at three bounded white Oaks standing ~
on the East side of the falls of Potowmout river and running from the said trees
South Fifty four Degrees West Fourteen perches thence South Eighty Seven
Degrees East Forty One perches thence North Seventy eight Degrees East
Forty perches thence North Four Degrees West Thirty Four perches thence
North Twenty two Degrees West Twenty perches thence North Nine Degrees
East Fifty perches thence North Forty Degrees East Thirty eight perches ~

Two hundred Acres Together with all trees Woods Hedges hedges Orchard buildings for ever improvements rents profits and Appurtenances whatsoever to the same belonging or in any way appertaining together with all the right little inheritance claimed and Demand whatsoever of facts from them the said Williams Pinxton and Peter Pinxton and their heirs for ever to have and to hold all the aforesaid two tracts of Land Called Wallborough Plantation and Pinxtons - Thicket with the promises and Appurtenances heretounto belonging unto him - the said John Worthington his heirs and Assignees for ever to the sole proper use and behoofe of him the said John Worthington his heirs and Assignees for ever and to have other uses intent or purpose whatsoever and he said Williams Pinxton and Peter Pinxton for themselves and their heirs Deth thereby Covenant promised grant and agreed to and with the said John Worthington his heirs and Assignees that they the said Williams Pinxton and Peter Pinxton and their heirs shall and will from time to time and at all times for ever hereafter warrant and defend the aforesaid tract of Land and - premises with its Appurtenances against all Manner of persons whatsoever Provided always and its further Covenanted that if the said Williams Pinxton or his heirs Doe well and truly to pay the said John Worthington his heirs - Rec: or Recd: the full sume of Twenty five pounds Sterling Money one or before the last Day of October in the year seventeen hundred and - Twenty nine and also sawfull Interest for the same from the Date hereof - then this Indenture and all the articles and things therin contained shall be for ever void and of No force and all the Land and promises revert - to the said Williams Pinxton In witness whereof the parties to this Indenture have hereunto Interchangeable set their hands and affixed - their seals the Day and year first above written
