was born in London, England, May 29th, 1841. She came to this country when she was 16 years old with her widowed mother and six children and settled in Warrick county, Indiana. She was married to John Gaddis, at Millersburg, Indiana, August 8th, 1861. To this union were born 12 children, six of whom, viz: William A., of Poplar Bluffs, Missouri; Jacob H., of Weatherford, Okla. Chas. W. of Mt. Sterling, Ill.; Priscilla May of Fairfield, Illinois, and Robert and Bert N. of Fairfield, Ill. are left to remember a mother's love and devotion, while six have crossed over to the great beyond. As was the custom in her early childhood in England she was christened a member of the Episcopalian or church of England. She was a near descendant on her mother's side of a prominent officer in the British army, who distinguished himself in the service of his country in the far east. She was distinguished, principally, as a home-maker, and a domestic woman, giving her life and strength in the services of her husband, children and home, where she reigned a queen indeed, receiving the homage and loyal devotion of all. Her life was filled with gentle thoughtful ministries, the remembrance of which will be the richest legacy to her family and friends.

Her husband preceded her to the daughter, by a former marriage, Mrs. A. S. Jessup of Xenia, whom she raised from early childhood to mingle her tears and sorrow equally with her own children. She leaves, also, to mourn her absence one sister, Mrs. Mariah Fisher, of Eaton Ohio, and Wm. Still of Xenia, Ill.

The funeral services were held at her late home, Sunday, p. m., at 2:30 conducted by Rev. J. S. Rose, of Mt. Vernon, Ill., an old time and intimate friend of the family. The music was in the hands of the Boze quartet who rendered some beautiful and touching selections. After the services were over the remains were conveyed to the beautiful Maple Hill cemetery, where they were tenderly laid away in the
