

ARTHUR McCABE.

The death of Arthur McCabe occurred at 9:30 p. m., Wednesday, Aug. 2nd, 1922, at the local hospital.

Mr. McCabe's health had been failing for some time. On Sunday evening he was taken suddenly ill and was moved Tuesday morning to the local hospital where he died two days later. The cause of his death was believed to be kidney trouble.

Mr. McCabe was born in the year 1851, in Lindsay, Ontario, Canada, the son of Rose and Michael McCabe. At the age of 18 he came to Minnesota. He started his work at the Fort Farm near Kennedy where he remained a number of years. From there he went to the Kennedy Farm where he remained also for a number of years. Later he became foreman at the Two River Farm. Here he endured many hardships for the welfare of the farm.

Some eight years later he bought a quarter section of land on section 24, where he made his home and resided up to the time of his death.

In the year 1904 he was united in marriage to Anna Obitz. To this union were born two children, Willie and Violet. Mr. McCabe was a well known farmer of this community and was well liked by all who knew him. He was always willing to give his help to his neighbors who were in need of it. He was always kind to his family and did all that was within his reach to help them. He had always experienced a hard life owing to the fact that his wife has been poorly and almost an invalid for about 13 years.

The funeral services were held at St. Patrick's church in Hallock. Rev. Father Odere of Argyle officiated, assisted by Rev. Father Baud of Hallock. The remains were laid to rest in Greenwood cemetery. He is survived by his wife and two children, Willie and Violet, wife of Hallock, one sister, Mrs. Anna Keef of Lindsay, Ontario; three brothers, James, of Brainard, Minn.; William, of Lindsay, Ontario; and Pat, of Minot, N. D.; also some nieces and nephews. Relatives who attended the funeral were: Jim McCabe, wife and son and grandson of Brainard, two nephews, Pat and Bernard McCabe of N. Dakota, and one niece, Mrs. Ann Crouse of Larimore, N. D.; and Chas. Obitz, brother of Mrs. McCabe.
